shaping the sound of Radio Wey



As the Programme Controller, I have the responsibility for the programme output at the station, and we need to keep in mind our audiences and the different types of programmes we can offer. We realise that being in hospital or a care home may feel strange to you and so we need to ensure that we are providing a means of entertainment which suits your environment whether you are in a ward, waiting for an appointment in outpatients or sitting in the Emergency Department.

At Radio Wey, our aim is to provide entertainment, which is local, unique and focused on our communities of the hospitals and care homes as well as aiding with the relief of sickness, poor health and age-related conditions amongst people in our local catchment area of Runnymede, Spelthorne, Elmbridge and Woking. Hence, we can be considered as a hospital, health and well-being radio service completely run by volunteers. We give our time freely to support everyone in the Ashford and St Peters NHS Foundation Trust and we have been doing this for 60 years.

Being in hospital, you will not have all the means of entertainment that you have at home. Certain patients nowadays are not generally kept in for long periods of time and in most cases, certain treatments and minor operations are carried out within the day.

Thus, Radio Wey has made changes to keep up with the different choices people can make to hear us. We continue to broadcast to the three hospitals [Ashford, St Peter's and Woking] and we have installed specialised speakers in the wards which are tuned to Radio Wey. If you would like one by your bedside during your stay. please ask a member of the ward staff. We also broadcast via the internet, and you can hear us through any computer or smartphone via our website radiowey. org or via the TuneIn app. We also have developed an app you can download to your smartphone giving you full access to listen to us live as well as listen again to a selection of our interviews - just scan the front cover of this magazine to get started. This is available in the Apple Store and Google Store and if you have a smart speaker, you can ask Alexa to "Play Radio Wey".

We continue to work with the various areas of the Hospital Trust to bring you news of events through our series of Hospital Watch bulletins. We have undertaken interviews and promotions with the dieticians, the well-being groups, maternity groups and the Sleepy Eyes project to help promote their services as well as improve your stay in hospital. At the heart of our programme schedule are the ward request shows, where we visit the patients and staff

and collect your musical choices. We then play them either later that day or the following day on air. Meeting the patients and chatting to them is a key part of what hospital radio is all about and this makes us provide a unique service. You will see elsewhere in this magazine an article about the impact that Hospital Radio has with the patients and staff and we are grateful for the part we play in that.

Getting in touch with us is so easy and we have a range of ways of reaching us. If we miss you when we visit your ward or you just want to get a mention on air, then you can call the studio on 01932 874433 or 2017 on the internal system at Ashford and St Peter's Hospitals. Press option 2 to leave a recorded message of your request or shout out or option 1 to speak to our presenter.

Alternatively, send an email message to studio@radiowey.org. We can even be reached using WhatsApp by sending a message, voice note or photo to 01932 874433.

Our schedule is varied and extensive and we broadcast 24 hours every day with live shows each day from 9am to 10pm. We cater for all musical tastes for example, we have Jazz Music, Rock Music, Gospel Music, Album tracks and Classical Music. We also provide a weekly one-hour programme of local news produced by the team from the volunteer team at the Woking Talking Newspaper. To put a smile on your face and give you a giggle, we also have a comedy hour where we broadcast extracts from classical comedy sketches.



We have guests from local charities, other organisations and groups as well as celebrities and stars popping into the studios and joining us on air during the day. So you can see we have a lot to offer, and all the details and news of our programmes can be found on our website or through our new app.

The world is a changing place and so we need to continue to change and adapt and so if you have an idea for a programme, or a genre of music you think would fill a gap, please do let me know. If there is something that we broadcast and you don't like it, I want to hear from you too. I appreciate all feedback, both good and bad, as we can only get better if we are serving our listeners as everyone has a choice and they can so easily go elsewhere. If you're reading this in hospital, you may not be feeling 100%, but I hope that Radio Wey helps lift your spirits a little through our wide range of music and our variety of presenters – all of us are volunteers!

shows sharing stories through classical music

The capacity of music to tell a story, to raise mental images of characters, places and eras, as well as to impact our emotions, is profound. As a musician, professor, lecturer. writer. broadcaster, researcher and reviewer. I remain struck after many decades by how music can feel so fresh and immediate, and vet at the same time it can cling to our memories and emotions like nothing else. Whether the music comes from the medieval era or last week's new film release, it can move us even without words.

As Radio Wey celebrates its 600th anniversary, I am celebrating first visiting Radio Wey eight years ago to be interviewed by Matt Richings, first on Rock this Wey, then on Request Stop. My journey has developed, with training and support, before taking on my own show. It is now six years on since my first solo show. I have recorded three complete audio books which have been aired on Radio Wev a few times. But more momentous, for me, is that I have passed my 200th episode of my own solo show, Helen's Classical Journey, that airs every Sunday afternoon, with a midweek repeat. This highlight came around

the same time that I met King Charles III at Windsor Castle (ves. I know. how exciting!). Our King was hosting an event to celebrate Community Music, and its benefit to our society. As my work spans

music education. community music projects and enabling access to music



and art education I was fortunate to be invited. I was struck by how many people I knew and how many people, like me, all balanced their day jobs in various parts of the music and education industries alongside charity work and volunteering.

My weekly show continues to share music written for orchestral instruments, but it is not restricted to music of the classical era (e.g. strictly speaking 1750-1800), rather I theme my weekly show to celebrate events, anniversaries, rituals, occasions, and themes, such as specific stories and seasons. The show spans film, TV and

video game music, through concert hall classics, to dance and theatre, opera and drama, as well as to both secular and sacred works from c.1100 AD to current releases (recently sharing the new film soundtrack from Mission: Impossible, The Final Reckoning released in May 2025). I love being able to navigate the globe, diverse cultures, heritages, histories and traditions through music. At the end of the day, everything I share has a story which is both human and emotional. This is why every week I dedicate time to a meditative moment whereby I slow the pace and settle the tone for us to think, breathe, and reflect. In such a fastpaced world, we all could do with more time to settle ourselves and have a personal moment to think and pause.

The 200th show meant a lot to me: it enabled me to thank Radio Wey for its support as I have developed my show, and it enabled me to share a journey through time of some of my favourite pieces of music too. I have followed on with a few request shows, integrating requests from patients, doctors and nurses that have come to me directly through my website or via email. I also

hosted a show dedicated to music requested by my friends and colleagues, all sharing their stories about the power of music. The personal touch is important – every composer has a story to tell, a message to

share, or an emotion to process. Just like our pop music favourites, classical music reminds us of life highs, such as weddings, graduations, birthdays, and personal firsts. With its persistent use in television adverts. radio adverts, TV, film and video games, we all hear a lot of classical music and recognise many of the themes, even we do not go out of our way to listen to it actively usually. I try to include well-known tracks every week, but I do so alongside what I hope are new pieces, with fresh melodies for our listeners. My visit to Windsor Castle reminded me: music is a uniquely human way to communicate beyond words and to share diverse stories.

Should you wish to catch up on any shows, they're all available on catch up via my website, where you can find shows dedicated to the Marvel Universe, to specific composers, to a season, to Halloween, and even to an entire two hour show dedication to meditation – just scan the OR

code to explore.

2025 marks 60 incredible years of Radio Wey. What began as a simple idea between two friends in the 1960s has become a vital part of the patient experience at Ashford, St Peter's and Woking Hospitals – and a much-loved institution across our local community.

The story began with Alan Timbrell and John Best, who visited patients in Weybridge Hospital and recorded their favourite music on tape to play back on the wards. What might have seemed a modest act of kindness quickly grew into something far greater. On 5th October 1967, the very first live broadcast aired from a purpose-built studio in Weybridge Hospital, transmitted through Bakelite headphones – later replaced by plastic tube "stethoscope" systems.

There were no studio kits back then. Equipment was built from scratch using radio hobbyist kits. Still, the station thrived. The original team of three presenters delivered 13 hours of live programmes each week – and enthusiasm quickly spread through hospitals in the region.

By the early 1970s, Radio Wey had expanded its reach through GPO telephone lines to Walton, Ashford, Ellesmere, St Peter's, and Woking Victoria Hospitals. In 1970, a new link to the Stompond Lane football ground enabled live match commentary, first broadcast on 11th October 1970 – a tradition of sports coverage that continues to this day.

By 1971, the station had 23 volunteers



producing 30 hours of programming each week, with a mix of ward requests and specialist music shows. In 1973, a major upgrade included a new mixing desk and studio equipment — marked with a special launch day featuring Terry Wogan, Noel Edmonds, Johnnie Walker, Tony Brandon, and Keith Skues.

In 1978, Radio Wey became a registered charity (No. 275620), and in 1984 moved from the original Weybridge studio – affectionately nicknamed "the shoebox" – into a former telephone exchange at St Peter's Hospital. After extensive fundraising and renovations, the new studios were officially opened by Sir Cliff Richard.

As technology advanced, so did Radio Wey. The 1990s and 2000s saw a leap into digital broadcasting, with the introduction of the Myriad playout system, replacing shelves of vinyl and CDs. By 2007, the station was broadcasting online, reaching care homes and even listeners overseas.

In 2008, Studio 1 was fully refitted to match the upgrades of Studio 2. These refurbishments cost over £40,000, supported through fundraising and a huge team effort from the membership.

Outside the studio, Radio Wey has long been active in the community. A dedicated outside broadcast caravan enabled the team to support fetes, events, and hospital open days —

raising awareness and essential funds for the station

As the NHS landscape evolved, some smaller hospitals closed, and coverage became focused on Ashford, St Peter's, and now Woking Community Hospital. The core mission, however, remains unchanged: bringing comfort, distraction and connection to patients through sound.

One enduring part of our programme schedule is the Sunday "Good News" service, now broadcast live from the new chapel in St Peter's, thanks to permanent cabling installed during construction of the A&E wing.

Now, in 2025, our 60th anniversary brings not only celebration but exciting transformation. Our new Radio Wey app (available on iOS and Android) gives listeners more flexibility than ever, including live listening and on-demand interviews. On our website, a new "Now Playing" feature displays the current track in real time – with plans to launch a listener request chart later this year.

Behind the scenes, volunteers now benefit from a refreshed Members Area, online training guides, and a new Index search tool to access physical and digital media more easily. We've also modernised our telephone software, integrated into the studio handsets for smoother caller interaction.



On air, our sound has been reenergised with a brand-new jingle package, two distinct voiceover styles, and even the introduction of celebrity voiceovers, all contributing to a sharper, more engaging listening experience. It's part of our refreshed station branding – echoed in this very magazine, with updated presenter profiles and a clean new look.

Today, Radio Wey has 41 dedicated members, delivering over 90 hours of live content every week, and all of it powered entirely by volunteers. From admin and production to IT and outside events, every aspect of the station reflects care, effort and community spirit.

We've celebrated national honours including Hospital Broadcasting Awards and proudly received the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, recognising our commitment to improving wellbeing through entertainment.

From reel-to-reel to real-time, Radio Wey has adapted to every wave of change while staying true to its purpose — to bring music, comfort and companionship to the bedside.

As we mark 60 years of Radio Wey, we thank every volunteer who has made it possible, and every listener who's tuned in. Here's to the next chapter — and to continuing to be the soundtrack to recovery, reflection, and resilience.



Training and recruitment



Radio Wey is run by volunteers and our recruitment activity ensures that we have a flow of people joining our ranks. The starting point for most people is the website where you will find the form to express interest in joining the radio station. It's under Support Us -> Join Us. Though we have had people join us following our outside events.

Radio Wey is a charity and all of the volunteers are members of the charity. We are also all registered as volunteers with the hospital trust. As a hospital volunteer the trust will carry out DBS and reference checks, as it is expected that you will visit the wards to meet patients and collect requests.

We run our recruitment events periodically when we have had a few people apply. These events are a chance for you to find out a bit more about Radio Wey. It also helps some of the committee members to meet you to understand your experience and motivation. Don't worry if you haven't been involved in radio before, we have lots of experienced members who can help. Some of our members have 60 years of experience. While most people join looking to be presenters, there are many other important roles that we need help with.

While we are not looking for experience we are looking for commitment. Training people to be able to operate to the required standards does take some time. Presenters are often on air within a few weeks. Having a presenter role with a show does mean having the same time each week for your show slot. As well as the time to prepare the content. Unlike commercial stations our presenters are producers as well, not just talking to a predefined playlist.

If you are interested in assisting in other areas such as studio engineering, fundraising, public relations (social media), outside events or another area that we may find useful, please also consider applying to join. We are always happy to have a chat.

Training and recruitment



Once people join as members they undergo a comprehensive training programme. Like any activity presenting a radio show requires many different skills. Some of these are technical, some of them softer. We train and practice on the operation of the technology we use to broadcast. Like driving. practice makes many of these skills automatic. Being able to push buttons and talk at the same time is important. But no more complicated with practice than talking to a passenger whilst driving. We also cover the softer side, how to structure and prepare a programme. Tricks and tips when presenting and interviewing. How to interact with people around the hospital and ward visiting. At the end of the training process new members are ready to go "On Air" for the first time.

For our more experienced members, things do change in the studios and with the station overall. We run training events for specific knowledge transfer when it is needed. This may be for a new piece of equipment or a new way of doing things in the studios. For example when we converted the studios to digital operation we retrained all members on the new equipment. We are always happy to run small one to one sessions for specific learning and coaching.

VISITING

Visiting times vary from ward to ward so please ensure you know the visiting times at the ward you wish to visit before coming to the hospital.

Most inpatient wards at Ashford, St Peter's and Woking Hospitals have visiting times between 2:00pm-8:00pm.

There are exceptions though so for specific ward information regarding times and direct telephone numbers go to https://ashfordstpeters.nhs.uk/patients/visiting-the-hospitals/visiting-times

Please:

- use the hand gel when entering and leaving the ward.
- respect other patients and keep noise to a minimum.
- no more than two visitors at the bedside and only bring young children if you really need to.
- help us minimise infection don't visit if you are unwell, use the chairs and please don't sit on a patient's bed.
- · do not use mobile telephones, cameras etc in patient areas.
- only bring in essential items for patients to keep areas clutter free.
- · do not bring in flowers for patients (fruit, chocolate and biscuits are fine).

- do not use physical violence, verbal aggression or threatening behaviour towards staff as this will not be tolerated.
- your relative or friend may have agreed for you to ask questions about their condition or treatment – if you wish to speak to a member of staff please ask at the start of your visit so this can be arranged.

Chaplaincy Available at your bedside

You may meet someone from Chaplaincy during your stay in Ashford, St Peter's or Woking hospitals. We are a team of chaplains and volunteers who support the wider healthcare team in offering additional pastoral spiritual care when our patients or their loved ones request it.

Ashford and St Peter's Hospitals have a multi faith worship centre open daily for the use of patients, staff, volunteers, visitors and friends.

At Ashford Hospital, the Centre is to the left of the main hospital entrance. Each centre has a Multi Faith Prayer Room equipped with prayer mats, sacred texts and faith symbols. You will also find a Chapel and a Quiet Room. There are ablution facilities for those who observe ritual washing before prayer and purpose designed shoe racks for those who remove footwear. The centres are available for private prayer and quiet reflection.

On Radio Wey, we broadcast Good News, a weekly programme of religious music and thoughts at 9:00am every Sunday morning.

Many of our patients cannot visit the centres but appreciate an opportunity to receive prayer, sacraments or blessing at their bedside. If you would like a visit from a Chaplain, please ask someone to leave us a message on ext 3324 or 01932 723324 if calling from outside the hospital.

If your request is urgent, ask someone to contact the hospital **switchboard dial 0** from an internal phone or **01932 872000** from outside to speak to the on-call Chaplain.
